Apart from the wide variety of hot food outlets we still have our local pharmacist, local. butcher. local. publicans and local motor factor to mention a few standing retailers. long We have hairdressers. barbers, a bakery, bicycle financial adviser, shop, bridal shop, beautician, picture framer, sweet shop, paint and wallpaper shop, accountant, car showroom, car wash, tile retailer, fireplace providers, spar, electrical retailer and I've sure I still have left traders

out. On top of that we have a gym, dentists, churches and undertakers (who also hire limousines). All of these businesses deserve our support. They have been there for us over many years – good and bad.

With ample off road car parking and short-stay roadside parking Edenderry is very accessible. Maureen Brown has also re-opened walkway through Gordon Speers former shop to link Bridge Street to the car park off Carrickblacker Avenue. Maureen, who owns the block which includes her own shop, The Candy Stop, decided the time was right to bring back the alleyway which had once linked her father business to the Edenderry square. Maureen's father ran Samuel Brown and Company, a wholesale motor factors and garage equipment business, which was located behind Gordon Speers Carpets and closed around 30 years ago. The Portadown Gasworks Gates Project:

ortadown Gasworks was built in 1846 is thought to and have been called 'The Portadown Gaslight Company Co. Ltd.' and later `ThePortadown Gaslight and Electricity Co. Ltd.' The business was on the site occupied in 2012 by the new ASDA store: bounded on two sides by Bridge Street and Joseph Street.

The Gasworks site incorporated buildings on roadside in Bridge Street and had its main entrance there fitted with a very handsome pair of substantial iron gates. manufacture and erection of the gates was entrusted 'Portadown Foundry' originally known 'John Woolsey Engineering' the 'Foundry'. which commenced business in 1844 and was situated nearby Foundry Street. The gateposts are

made of cast iron and embellished with the 'Portadown Foundry' logo.

The gasworks ceased to trade in Nov 1993 and the site, including the gates, derelict it was announced. early in 2012, that ASDA was to build a new supermarket there. As demolition of the old buildings commenced make way for site works. 'Edenderry Cultural and Historical Society' approached **ASDA** who agreed that it could have the gates refurbishment and re-erection in the new perimeter fence in Bridge site, as near as possible to their position. Mr. David Simpson

instrumental in negotiating that ASDA would cooperate the project and they agreed to make a contribution to the cost, in recognition the Edenderry community's industrial heritage. Their contractor also carried out the foundation work and re-erection of the gates at their cost.

In

February 2012 the gates were duly removed to a workshop facility. kindly provided by Mr David Jameson of Jameson Roofing where Ltd. two ofthe Society's volunteers. Harold Trouton and Robert Magee, worked on refurbishment of them with considerable skill and effort until Oct 2012. Harold was the last manager of the Gasworks and expert welder, having served his apprenticeship with 'Foundry'. By then time the ASDA was completion and an

installation design was drawn up by ASDA's consulting engineers, conjunction with Wilson Steen of the Society. Wilson also designed a plaque that was made, engraved and installed by Ian Milne and Sons. All aspects of the project were carried out to the superb standard visible today. The gates greatly enhance the new ASDA site, the environs of Bridge Street and are universally admired.

were originally of hand decorative, forged, wrought iron construction carried out by blacksmiths completely without welds. Each gate is 8ft high x 5ft 6ins wide and weighs 1/4 ton. The gateposts are of substantial cast iron construction and together with the gates are testaments to the skills the Foundry's blacksmiths. foundry-men pattern makers of the time as well as those exercised bv Harold and Robert during the refurbishment.


