Festival of Remembrance



As a result of the overwhelming success of last year's inaugural Festival of Remembrance in Portadown Town Hall, the Portadown Branch of the Royal British Legion, in association with Edenderry Community Development Association, once again hosted the event on Thursday 4th November. The organisers were delighted with the positive feedback and encouragement they received from the public following last year's festival, which raised in excess of £3,000 for the Poppy Appeal.

The full auditorium was treated to an excellent evening compered by local man Niall Crozier

and featured the musical talents of local artists St Mark's Band, Stonewall and Portadown Ladies Choir. The Bugles, Pipes and Drums of the 2nd Battalion, The Royal Irish Regiment, by kind permission of Lt Col P A J Walker, were enthusiastically welcomed as they performed their reper-

toire to perfection. In addition to those already mentioned the organising committee wish to thank the Mayor of Craigavon and the distinguished guests for their attendance, the Standard Bearers, serving and ex-service members and representatives of the uniformed youth organisations who formed the Mus-

ter. Following the entertainment the mood changed as the An Act of Remembrance took the form of a religious service conducted by Rev Canon J Campbell and Rev R Loney.

Following the Last Post the Exhortation was given by Major Pete Hodgson (ret'd) and a Piper's Lament was played.

During the Two Minute Silence, poppies fell on a sombre audience before the Reveille by Mark Mullen.

Two young people who took a significant part in the evening were Matthew Canning of Clounagh Junior High School who read The Call, and

ing the concert. One of the main driving forces behind last year's venture was the late Mr Jim Edgar, secretary of the Edenderry group. Those associated with this year's plan-

ning sorely missed Jim's input but were determined to make this the successful annual event Jim always envisaged. Jim was a keen supporter of the armed forces and it was in

his memory that the Edenderry group held a retiring collection for the charity Help for Heroes which raised £475, in addition to a substantial amount raised for the Poppy Appeal.



Private John Sharpe — Member of the 9th Batt. R.I.F.

Private Sharpe was born in Laurelvale in 1895 and later lived at 44 Carrickblacker Road, Edenderry. He was a member of the 9th Battalion R.I.F and saw action at the Somme, Cambrai, Ypres and St. Quentin. After being almost killed by a landmine while training at Borden camp, England in 1914, Private Sharpe, his head still bandaged, landed in France, preferring to be with his comrades rather than return

home. His good work with a Lewis machine gun at Messines Ridge in 1917 earned him the Military Medal for gallantry in repulsing an enemy attack.

Private Sharpe recalled the war was very rough at times, especially after the Somme when the dead were buried ten to each grave.

He was known to have said he would not take all the money in Portadown to go through the war again. After returning unscathed

from the Great War he returned to Portadown and Major Rev F J Halahan MC gave him a job reference by writing: "A brave and gallant British soldier".

John Sharpe was married in Seagoe Parish Church in 1920 and both he and his wife Margaret worked for many years in Hamilton Robb's Linen Factory.

An ardent Portadown football supporter, John was seen regularly at Shamrock Park.

Miss Anne Crawford Acheson

Edenderry woman Miss Anne Crawford Acheson, formerly of Edenderry, Portadown, was awarded the C.B.E. for services rendered during the Great War 1914-1918.

Miss Acheson was appointed a Commander of the Order of the British Empire on the 1st January 1919 "for services in connection with the war" in her capacity as Head of the Plastic Department, Orthopaedic Branch, Queen Mary's Needlework Guild. She was invested with this

award at Buckingham Palace on 25th February 1919.

Ann Crawford Acheson was born on the 5th August 1882 at Carrickblacker Avenue, Portadown. Her father was John Acheson whose profession was that of a druggist, and her mother was Harriet Acheson.

Miss Ann Crawford Acheson, C.B.E. was an accomplished craftswoman, with a special talent for decorative garden figures in lead.

She received her professional training at the Royal

College of Art, South Kensington, gaining her diploma in sculpture in 1910. She was a Fellow of the Royal Society of British Sculptors.

For a good many years Miss Acheson was a regular exhibitor at the Royal Academy, the great majority of her works shown there being garden or fountain figures under such titles as "The Imp" "Water Baby" "Watersprite" "Mischief" and "Boy with Puppy". Among other works, she was responsible for the

portrait bust in the Gertrude Bell Memorial.

Miss Acheson was one of several sculptors who, during the 1914-1918 war, worked at the Surgical Requisites Association's headquarters at Mulberry Walk, Chelsea.

OBJECTIVES

It will do so by associating the statutory authorities, voluntary organisations and inhabitants in a common effort to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of the social welfare, education, recreation or other leisure-time occupations with the object of improving the conditions of life for the inhabitants.

Edenderry Community Development Association will facilitate the greater involvement of marginalised sections of the wider community, all genders, age groups, the disabled and ethnic minorities in the life of the community.

Promote awareness of the history, folklore and cultural heritage of the area. Encourage acceptance, understanding and appreciation of the cultural diversity of the area of benefit. Promote, by education and encounter, good community relations with other groups and cultural traditions and interact with same in a spirit of peace and community reconciliation.
