On Friday 8th September the Ulster Scots Agency are sponsoring an evening in Edenderry Orange Hall on the ever popular Ulster Poets W F Marshall and our local poet Moses Taggart.

Mervyn Gilmour and Jim Smart who are authorities on the subject will speak on the life and times of Marshall and readings of some of his poems including the famous *Me An' Me Da:*

Of which almost everyone knows the first line "I'm, livin in Drumlister."

Dr John Wright will tell the storey of the Birches poet Moses Taggart who emigrated from there to America in the nineteenth century.

The evening commences at 8.00pm. Admission is £1.00 including tea and biscuits.

W F Marshall, The Bard of Tyrone

Rev William Forbes Marshall was born at Drumragh, Omagh, and received his early education in the primary school at Sixmilecross, where his father was principal. He went on to Royal School, Dungannon, College. Galway. and Queen's the Presbyterian College, Belfast. In 1916 he was ordained minister in Aughnacloy but moved to Castlerock, Co Londonderry, twelve years later.

Marshall's publications include a novel, *Planted By A River*, and *Ulster Sails West* (a history of 18th century Ulster emigration to the United States), as well as four books of poems, all of which have the name of his native county in the title; not surprisingly he was dubbed "the Bard of Tyrone." The poems include one that became the school song of the Royal School; many are in Ulster dialect and include the famous *Me An' Me Da:*

> "I'm, livin in Drumlister, An' I'm gettin' very oul' I have to wear an Indian bag To save me from the coul'. The deil man in this townlan' Wos claner raired nor me, But I'm livin' in Drumlister In clabber to the knee.

Marshall is buried at Tullyneill Co. Tyrone.

Moses Teggart, The Poet of The Boglands.

Over a century ago a young man who was to become a household word in the Birches district, emigrated to the United States of America. Moses Teggart was born in the townland of Ballinary on 1st February 1854, the son of the local postman who also held the position of Parish Clerk of Tartaraghan Parish Church, where part of his duty was to answer the responses on behalf of the considerable proportion of the congregation who were illiterate.

Young Moses showed considerable promise as a pupil at Cloncore Lower Primary School and he became a great admirer of the poet Robert Burns.

In the 1880's he joined the steady stream of emigrants to the New World; and arrived in Springfield Massachusetts Moses, however, could not forget the environment in which he had grown up, the turf-stacks, the heather and the belles, all are portrayed in life-like fashion in his poems often with a touch of humour as in the poem "Treasure Trove".

In the autumn of 1908 he returned to visit his aged father who was then in failing health, and while he was staying at home his step mother died. The dampness and rigor of the winter weather told on his constitution and he decided to return to the U.S.A but did not live to complete the voyage and his body was committed to the

deep in mid Atlantic.♦

History of Edenderry NURSE WOODS

Born 17th March 1902 in Ballynargin Coagh Co.Tyrone, she had two sisters and a brother. Her parents were farmers. She

had no interest in farming and worked for a short period in an office in Cookstown. However she always had a desire to become a nurse, so she left home and travelled to Lurgan where she began her nursing career in Lurgan Hospital. She worked hard and diligently at her profession, obtained the qualifications of S.R.N. S.C.M. and attained the position of Nursing Sister in the hospital.

It was while working in Lurgan, that she was to meet her future husband, Mr. Fred Woods, a member of a well known Edenderry business family. He had a very serious accident on a motorcycle and it was while nursing him that they fell in love and were married in 3rd Cookstown Presbyterian Church on the 19th May 1931. Their best man was Mr. William McClements an Edenderry Monumental Sculptor. The Bride's Maid was Nurse Wood's Sister. Mary

They set up home in 13 Carrickblacker Avenue and eventually moved to 68 Bridge Street. After settling in Portadown, Nurse Woods decided to become a District Midwife and she carried on her profession for approximately forty years, during that time she delivered thousands of babies.

Nurse Woods was well known through out the town in her Navy Uniform, with her bag on the back of her bicycle. Sometimes travelling over five miles twice a day to see some patients.

With more heavy and modern equipment, having to be used, the bicycle was no longer suitable, so she had to buy a car (Ford Prefect). Problem! She could not drive so a well-known taxi driver from James Street, Mr. Ned McClatchey took on the difficult task of Driving Instructor and no test being required, she eventually took to the road.

Nurse Woods enjoyed her work and made many friends from both communities. She retired in 1970 and received in recognition of her service, a Silver Salver from The General Practitioners of Portadown.

Nurse Woods moved from Edenderry on retirement to Hobson Park, where she nursed her husband Fred for 12 years, at home, after he had taken a stroke. Nurse Woods passed away peacefully on the 12th November 1987.
