
On Friday the 19th May at 8.00pm Richard Edgar will give a talk and Power Point Slide Show in Edenderry Orange Hall on Wades, Edenderry, Laurelvale and Tandragee this show contains many unique slides, admission is £1.00 and tea will be served at the end of the evening.

A talk on Wade pottery was given by Harry Eakin of Edenderry Historical Society and Dr. J. Wright who is the leading authority in Ireland on the subject to an Antiques Group in the Millennium Arts Centre on Wednesday 19th April 2006. The Society are writing a book on Wade Ireland and intend to hold a major Exhibition in the Millennium Arts Centre in 2007 to launch the book.

Edenderry Old Primary School

One of the most prominent buildings in the Edenderry area and one, which many residents attended, was the old Edenderry Primary School on the Carrickblacker Road. Again, like so many buildings in Portadown, it has since been demolished – no room for nostalgia in Portadown so it seems.

The school was erected in 1888 and the construction contract was awarded to Bright Bros. for the sum of £1280. The school building was finished in a



distinctive yellow brick and consisted of two large rooms, four classrooms, and three cloakrooms. Toilets were positioned outside in the yard and there was playground provision for girls and boys.

A schoolmaster's residence was also erected adjacent to the school this building costing in the region of £470.

For almost 100 years Edenderry Primary School was at the centre of education in the area – a school attended and loved by successive generations of Edenderry children.

In 1968 the primary school and pupils relocated to a purpose built building in Killicomaine, which has flourished ever since. The old school was demolished in 1988 (I know some people who obtained souvenir bricks!!) to make way for Carrickeden Grange sheltered accommodation. $James\ S.\ Kane$

Dear Sir,

I was very interested to read the article on Victoria House in the February issue of Edenderry News there were however some omissions from the story.

For a good many years between the wars Victoria House was a maternity and nursing home, the doctor in charge was a Dr. Rowlett and the nursing staff was presided over by the matron Mrs Ward and her daughter. Dr. Rowlett stabled his pony and trap in the stable where Gordon Speer's shop now is, The good doctor watered his pony in the water trough in the centre of the square before going out on his rounds.

During the Second World War the house became a billet for army officers who were stationed in the ordnance factory in Watson Street (Wades).

Story tellers

Memories of George Weir growing up in Florence Court

It was a great place to live and the best neighbours anyone could hope to have. If a neighbour was in trouble the Street would rally round.

George remembers the late Mr Don Stevenson of Stevenson & Cumming Estate Agents coming to collect the rent. His collection was always on a Saturday morning and as soon as he turned the corner at the top of the street every door was closed until he left. In those days money was scarce therefore the payment of rent was not a priority.

The Street was affectionately known by the residents as the 'BACK STREET' and Tam John Liggett always referred to it as the 'BOULEVARD'.

During the summer holidays most of the boys would spend their time at the River Bann at a spot called the 'S'. We played at the 'S' from morning until dark and swam a lot.


Some sad times were experienced as when young George McCann was killed in action in the Second World War and Jim Hunter was lost at sea. he served with the Royal Navy and was a stoker on the minesweepers.

During the War years 42/43 he and the late Jackie Hamilton worked in Hamilton Robb's Linen factory. The only night they had off was a Saturday night and most of the children of the area went to the cinema on that night. He remembers his weekly pay being £1 10 shillings and 5d, £1.57 $\frac{1}{2}$ in today's decimal currency.

His father worked for the Army as a tailor during the Second World War and was away from home most of the time and Teenie Roney volunteered to look after him. He was treated like a son and he thought the World of her. She made the best soup in Portadown and it was that good she made for more than half of the residents.

Anna Black traded as a grocery/confectionery shop at no.10 after her mother died. During the War years when things were difficult to obtain Anna always managed to stock the shop. She sold it and emigrated to Canada, married and died in that country. She was badly missed and is always remembered with affection by the ex-residents. Sadly Florence Court was demolished in the 60/70's but he still has fond memories.




