

## **Royal British Legion Festival of Remembrance**

he Portadown Branch of the Royal British Legion in association with Edenderry Community Development Association will be hosting a Festival of Remembrance in the Town Hall Portadown on Thursday 29th October 2009 at 7.47pm (seated by 7.30):

Entrance is by ticket only, on a first come, first serve basis, tickets are £10 each and they are available from Hoy's Butcher, Eden Pharmacy Bridge Street and the Royal British Legion Club in Thomas Street.

The programme will consist of; The Muster which will include representatives from the Royal Navy, the Army, the Royal Air Force, PSNI, Ex-Service personnel and youth organisations

The Festival will be compered by Niall Crozier and feature St Marks Brass Band, Portadown Male Voice Choir, Stonewall Folk Group, the Bugles, Pipes and Drums of the 2nd Battalion Royal Irish Regiment

The Act of Remembrance will take the form of a short religious service, followed by the Last Post, Exhalation, Pipers Lament, Two Minute Silence, during which the poppies will fall, the Reveille, the Call "In Flanders Fields" followed by "The Response"

This is a first time an event of this kind has been held in Portadown and as all the proceeds are in AID OF THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL the organisers hope it will become an annual event.

# ECHS Heritage Lottery Grant

**The** history of Portadown Foundry is to be explored in a new project thanks to a £21,100 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF). The grant was awarded to Edenderry Cultural and Historical Society and will be used to record and interpret the history of the Foundry, which was at the heart of local industry for 127 years.

**Portadown** Foundry manufactured machinery for agriculture and linen mills, built barges to facilitate canal trade and serviced the two World War campaigns. In its later life its structural steelwork was used in the construction of new hospitals, factories and government buildings. The Foundry is of great significance to both the local community and Northern Ireland's wider industrial heritage.

**The** project will be led by Edenderry Cultural Society and developed by a team of volunteers who will be recruited from the local community. Together they will research the history of the Foundry by collecting photographs and artefacts and interviewing former employees, their families and the general public to record their personal memories, experiences and stories which were in danger of being lost.

**The** volunteers will receive training and support to help them acquire the skills necessary to undertake the project. Working in partnership with local organisations including the Irish and Local Studies Library and the Community Network Craigavon, they will receive training in collecting oral histories, interview techniques, research and recording skills and IT.

**To** raise awareness of the Foundry's heritage the findings will be used to produce a book which will be distributed to local schools, libraries and museums. A DVD and website are also planned and an exhibition of photographs and artefacts will be created and displayed at various sites in the area including the Edenderry Heritage Centre and the Millennium Court Centre in Portadown. Throughout the project a series of talks and lectures will be delivered to local schoolchildren and groups to involve the wider community in the project.

**Funding** for the project was awarded through the HLF 'Your Heritage' programme which provides grants of up to £50,000 for projects that help people learn about their own or other people's heritage. Head of HLF Northern Ireland, Paul Mullan, said: "This project will record the history of the Foundry and highlight its place of importance in not only local terms, but in the wider context of Northern Ireland's industrial development. The opportunities for volunteers to become involved in researching and recording this history will ensure that learning and participation are at the heart of the project, and we are delighted to be involved."

**Cardwell** McClure from Edenderry Cultural and Historical Society welcomed news of the award: "Portadown Foundry had a long and interesting history and it would have been a great shame if this was lost. Thanks to the HLF grant we will be able to preserve the memories and experiences of those who worked there and collate artefacts and photographs to create a lasting legacy for this important Edenderry industry."

Do you own or use an Electric Blanket? Old or damaged electric blankets can cause fires. Each year the Southern Health and Social Care Trust's Promoting Wellbeing Team holds a number of FREE Testing and Information Days.

Last year 356 blankets were tested and 205 (57%) failed the safety test. If you would like to have your electric blanket(s) tested, please contact Miss Rebekah Vanscoy, Promoting Wellbeing Team, Brownlow Health Centre, Tel: 028 3834 4973. Electric blankets that fail the safety test are retained and disposed of. A voucher for £15.00 is given for every failed blanket to help with the cost of purchasing a new blanket. Only one voucher can be used per blanket.
