#### Railway

Following the success of Fred Coopers Film shows last year we again will be presenting another show on the GNR Railway. Fred will present the film show on Friday, 24th February at 8.00pm in Edenderry Orange Hall. The film show will contain rare archive film from the 1920's and 1930's, footage of the Cavan and Leitrim Railway and the arrival of Chipperfield's Circus in Portadown by rail in the 1960's. Admission is £3.00 including supper.

The first Portadown railway station was at Seagoe and opened on the 31<sup>st</sup> January 1842. Trains terminated at this temporary station for some eight months. Contractor Williams Dargan's men toiled with pick and shovel to build the mile long embankment across the bog to the Watson Street site of what was to be a more permanent station which was opened nine months later on 12<sup>th</sup> September 1842.►

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#### **<**Railway Film Show

Ulster railway trains terminated at Portadown for a few years while a wooden bridge was built over the River Bann and the railway to Armagh was completed on 1<sup>st</sup> March 1848. At roughly the same time a new station opened at Woodhouse Street and the station at Watson Street closed. In the 1850's Portadown became a true junction when the Dublin line (1858) and the Dungannon line joined the Ulster railway at Woodhouse Street earning "Portadown it's Hub of the North" nickname.

With the increase in traffic it was decided to build a new station on the site of the old 1842 station at Watson Street, north of the Bann Bridge. This Grand station opened on the 1<sup>st</sup> July 1863 and the woodhouse Street station was converted to cater for the now considerable goods traffic.

Sadly in the fifties and sixties Portadown ceased to be a rail junction the Armagh-Clones line closing in 1957 and the 'Derry Road' in 1965, leaving only the Belfast-Dublin main line through the town. A new station opened at Woodhouse Street in 1970 and the old 1863 Watson Street station was demolished - a sad end to a proud

Victorian station which served Portadown well for over a century.

Don't forget - you're more than welcome to come along any Thursday morning 10.30-12.30. New members





# Victoria reigns in Edenderry

Queen Elizabeth II may be on the throne but Victoria reigns supremely in Edenderry. Victoria house has been part of the local scenery for so long townspeople could be forgiven for overlooking the 170 years of history behind its walls.

The builders moved in over 20 years ago and completely remodelled the interior to bring it up to modern day standards to provide 6 luxury flats. The old chimney pots were replaced and timber frame windows with uPVC, and other than this work the exterior is no different to when it was built in early Victorian days.

The earliest records of the House go back to Christmas Eve 1859 when Elizabeth, Cornelius and Thomas Carleton leased the property to Andrew James Lutton for 500 years.

Lutton was a linen manufacturer and the House was an appropriate residence for him as it overlooked his factory across the road in Watson Street. It later became the munitions factory during the Second World War and in 1946 was bought by the Wade Pottery Group.

Lutton died in January, 1870 and the property was transferred to his two sons, John and Thomas. In 1901 they transferred it to Andrew James Lutton and Son Limited and the company mortgaged it to Robert G. Glendinning to secure a loan. Apparently they could not meet the payments on this loan, and in December 1918, Robert Glendinning sold the House to David H. Warnock for £300.

Warnock died the following year and his daughter Martha Jane inherited the House and she sold it a year later to John Gilpin a coachbuilder of Bridge Street, Edenderry for £1,050.

John Gilpin died in January, 1929 and his widow and son sold the House to Robert Brown in 1935 for £1000. Robert Brown was the grandfather of the present owner Miss Maureen Brown. Her own father Sammy Brown, the well known Edenderry business man also lived in the House.

Over this past 170 years it has seen numerous changes in the Edenderry area. It has witnessed two World Wars, births, deaths, prosperity and recession

and Edenderry's significance to the growth of Portadown...

Let's hope that Victoria House reigns for another 170 years.

## **Heroes of Edenderry**

In this column James Kane will be focusing on the heroes of Edenderry who left all that was dear to fight for King and Country and the defence of freedom during the two world wars. In this issue we pay tribute to Private George McCann one of the youngest soldiers from Portadown to make the supreme sacrifice during World War Two.

## George McCann

### Private 14429060, 7/9<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Royal Scots (The Royal Regiment) Killed in Action 17 April 1945, Aged 18 years

The McCann family lived at 1 Florence Court in Edenderry. George was the son of James and Minnie McCann. Like all Ulstermen George McCann volunteered for war service as there was no conscription in Northern Ireland. Again like many servicemen before him George lied about his age to enlist - he was two weeks short of his 17<sup>th</sup> birthday.

He enlisted in the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers in 1943 at Omagh. In August 1943 Fusilier McCann was transferred to the Royal Scots. He was on Home Service with that regiment until being posted to North West Europe in January 1945.

The 7/9<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Royal Scots formed part of the 155 Infantry Brigade of the 52<sup>nd</sup> (Lowland) Division during the advance into Germany. Although the war was nearing it's end some German units still fought with a grim determination and it was during one such engagement near the town of Soltau that 18 year old Private McCann was killed in action on 17 April 1945. His platoon had captured 40 German prisoners when a soldier fired a panzerfaust from a building killing Private McCann and his comrade. He lies buried in Becklingen War Cemetery, Germany. Grave 15. B. 14.♦
